Dear Governor Northam and Secretary Carey,

With the historic expansion of Medicaid eligibility in Virginia last year, hundreds of thousands of additional Virginia residents are now enrolled in Medicaid health care services. Your leadership and unwavering commitment to the health of underserved Virginians is having a lasting impact on the lives of many.

We write with the belief that true, comprehensive health coverage for Virginians is now within reach. The undersigned organizations know first-hand that oral health is a vital piece of health care. Coverage for dental services in Medicaid will enable Virginians to improve their chronic disease outcomes, be better able to enter and succeed in the workforce, and prevent costly and painful dental disease. To that end, we ask you to further improve access to critical health services by including a comprehensive dental benefit for all adults enrolled in Medicaid as part of your proposed amendments to the 2020-2022 budget.

Currently, Medicaid dental only covers pregnant women and emergency extractions for adults.

On May 21st, Dr. Jennifer Lee, director of Virginia's Medicaid program, presented to the Senate Finance Committee and stated that **dental is one of the biggest unmet needs in the Commonwealth**. Adding a comprehensive adult dental benefit that includes preventive and restorative services will **improve the health of over nearly one million Virginia adults** who are currently enrolled in Medicaid. This will save the Commonwealth money by improving chronic disease management and reducing inappropriate emergency department visits. Additionally, a benefit will support the Commonwealth's dental safety net clinics by providing an additional revenue source.

Virginia Medicaid currently covers one-third of all Virginia adults with disabilities and three-fifths of all nursing home residents; both population groups have high rates of chronic disease and poor access to dental care. Fa4% of older adults cited dental care as their most frequent unmet need, second only to transportation.

A dental benefit will improve chronic disease outcomes and save the Commonwealth money.

 Poor oral health, specifically gum disease, is associated with diabetes, high blood pressure, heart disease, and stroke. When a person with diabetes treats their gum disease, their annual medical costs are lowered by \$2,840, and they reduce their hospital admissions by 39.4%.<sup>3</sup>

A dental benefit will decrease the use of the emergency department for dental issues.

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Because Medicaid-enrolled adults do not have adequate dental coverage, they often visit the emergency department (ED) for issues related to dental disease. EDs do not provide any dental services, and patients can only receive prescriptions to address infection and pain. In 2016, Virginia Medicaid spent \$3.3 million dollars on avoidable ED visits for dental issues.4

A dental benefit will improve treatment outcomes in patients with high-severity and chronic substance use disorders.

Individuals receiving integrated comprehensive oral health care, along with treatment for substance use disorders, are twice as likely to be employed on discharge and twice as likely to abstain from drug use compared to those who did not receive comprehensive dental treatment.<sup>5</sup>

We hope you agree that a Medicaid adult dental benefit with preventive and restorative services is a necessary next step to ensure the underserved in Virginia have access to comprehensive health care.
